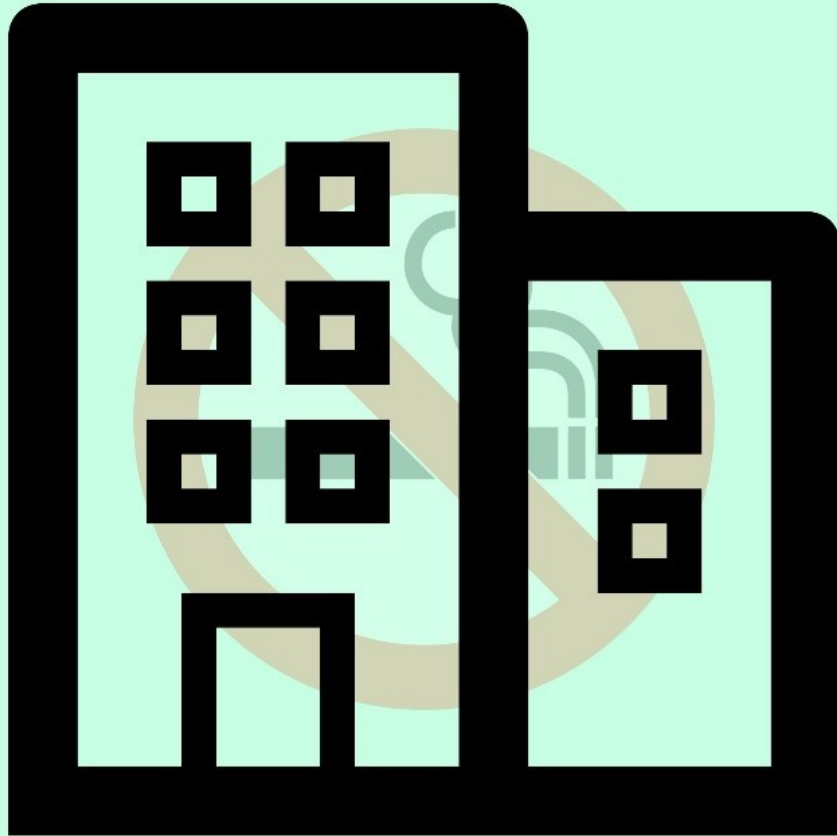


Multi-unit dwellings and second-hand smoke



-There is no safe level of exposure to second-hand smoke

-There are more than 4000 chemicals in second-hand smoke

-According to Health Canada, 36% of people living in multi-unit housing are exposed to second-hand smoke seeping into their home from neighbouring units

-Second-hand smoke can enter through ventilation systems, cracks in the walls, doorways, plumbing and electrical systems or by drifting in from neighbouring balconies

-Long-term exposure to SHS can cause cancer in adults and sudden infant death syndrome, ear infections, asthma and bronchitis in children

-100% smoke-free buildings are the only way to protect you and your family from exposure to toxic second-hand smoke.
